FOR STARTERS

In a matchpoint duplicate, you pick up:

Everyone is vulnerable, your partner is the dealer and she passes. You are thinking of opening 1, but before it can get to you, your RHO opens 1,!

What do you do?

It's important to reset your thinking when this happens. The opening bid in front of you changes everything, and you should pass.

Certain – let's call them – 'modernists' would double 1, claiming: "I have 3-card support for every other suit". There are at least two good reasons why this is a bad idea in this situation. Can you work out what they are?


Reason 1 is that partner passed as dealer. This means there's a fair chance you will not win this auction, even if you do come in, and that means that your strength will be exposed to the eventual declarer.

Reason 2 is that you are vulnerable. There is also a fair chance that if you double here, you will win the auction. If your hand is dummy, partner is unlikely to say "thankyou" when she sees it! Going one or two down will probably be a very poor score.

If bad things can easily happen after your double whether or not you buy the contract, then perhaps it is best to stay shtum.

You pass, LHO responds 1NT, and all pass.

Partner leads \$5, and you see:



Declarer calls low from dummy, perforce, and you play ...?

Obviously you will play an honour, but which one? It is essential that, when partner leads a suit, you play the *lower* of touching honours, in this case the jack. When the full deal is shown, we will see why this is.

▶ Declarer wins your ♣J with the ace, and plays
▶ 10. Partner wins this with the ace and leads the ♣8. You play the queen and this wins the trick, declarer following with the ♣2.

Now what?


NUMBER OF STREET, STREE

It looks like partner started with *K985 or *K1085. The fact that partner's second club was higher than his first indicates she doesn't have a lower one, and this implies that she has led from a 4-card suit. So you can take 3 club tricks, the diamond ace, and you also have 3 heart tricks, with your *AKJ sitting over dummy's queen.

But partner is unaware of the heart situation. If you play back your third club, how will she know to subsequently play a heart rather than a spade?

You should play the $\mathbf{v}K$ first – when that wins, partner will know you must have the ace behind it and can confidently play a heart after taking her clubs.

The full deal:



Why was it essential to play the *J rather than the *Q back at trick 1? Look at it from partner's point of view. When you played the *J, and declarer won the *A, partner could confidently expect you to have the queen, because if declarer had it, then he would have won the first trick cheaply with the *Q.

Therefore it was safe for partner to continue with a second round of clubs.

But if you play the AQ at trick 1, partner cannot be sure who has the AJ.

Points to remember:

- When your RHO opens with the bid you were planning to make yourself, it's usually right to pass. (Take a look at what befalls you, should you double on this hand. You will end up in 2*, possibly doubled, and take a welldeserved minus score.)
- When partner leads a suit, play the lowest of touching honours.
- The best defenders pay attention to making life easy for their partners. In this case, it was to play the ♥K, directing the subsequent defence.

TEST YOUR BIDDING

Takeout Doubler's Rebid

LHO	Partner	RHO	You
		1 🔶	D'ble

In previous months we have explored the nature of hands worth a takeout double, and how partner should respond to them. Now let's look at doubler's rebid.

With a type 1 takeout double (short in their suit, support for every other suit), your choices are simple: you either pass partner's response or raise him (with a better hand). Doing anything else shows a type 2 takeout double.

Type 2 doubles (17+ HCP, unsuitable for a 1NT bid) have other rebid options. Bidding a new suit shows at least 5 cards and around 17-20 HCP. If you have a notrump oriented hand, you can rebid in notrumps. If you are lucky enough to have 4-card support for partner's response, then you can offer a jump-raise.

Rarely, you have a turbo-charged type 2 hand: so strong that you are likely to have a game contract no matter how weak partner is. There are only two ways to force partner to bid again: you either jump in a new suit, or you make a cue-bid (in this example, 2).

Choose doubler's rebid with each of the following hands:

(a) * AQ72 * J54 * 3 * AK872
(b) * J54 * AQ72 * 3 * AK872
(c) * J54 * AQ72 * 93 * AK72
(d) * KJ8 * AQ6 * AK4 * K1072
(e) * AK43 * AKQJ * Q9 * QJ7
(f) * KQ4 * AQ * 943 * AKJ72

(a) ▲ AQ72 ♥ J54 ♦ 3 ♣ AK872

Pass. You've arrived. 1♥ was not the response you were hoping for, but this should be a reasonable spot to play. To rebid 2♣ here would show a Type 2 hand: 17+ HCP, which you do not have.

(b) ▲ J54 ♥ AQ72 ♦ 3 ♣ AK872

 $2 \bullet$. A respectable hand: 14 HCP and 17 total points in support of hearts. If partner is at the top of his 0-8 HCP range, then maybe there is a game contract available.

(c) ▲ J54 ♥ AQ72 ◆ 93 ♣ AK72

2♥. This is the most controversial bid in this set. The hand is considerably weaker than in (b), and there is really very little chance of a game in hearts. So why raise? It's time to think about the opponents ... if you pass 1♥, it is an open invitation for LHO to come back into the auction, perhaps with a 1♠ bid, or delayed support for diamonds. You want to block that option out, hence the defensive raise to 2♥. Yes it's possible that partner will now bid again, expecting a better hand, and you end up going down. So passing 1♥ cannot be severely criticized.

(d) ▲ KJ8 ♥ AQ6 ♦ AK4 ♣ K1072


1NT. This shows about 19-21 HCP, i.e. a hand too strong for an immediate 1NT overcall.

(e) ▲ AK43 ♥ AKQJ ♦ Q9 ♣ QJ7

3•. With 22 HCP, it's tempting to bang out 4•, but the hand is full of losers: 5 of them in fact. Partner will need to cover two of them to make game, and with such a hand, he will bid 4• over your strong invitation.

(f) ▲ KQ4 ♥ AQ ♦ 943 ♣ AKJ72

2. Another fine hand. Reveal your type 2 double by bidding a natural, non-forcing 2., showing around 17 – 20 HCP.

BRIDGE FROM HERE AND THERE Ian McCance

Nowadays my bridge is confined to BBO, which is better than some destinations. The random opposition is usually ignorant of defence (see later). I try to keep my ego in bounds.


▲ J5 ♥ Q105 ♦ 8765 ♣ K762

I'm South with this moderate collection but partner is better - he opens 2*. I show negative, and he has a diamond suit and I have support. We play fast arrival but I think my pictures may fill gaps so 4* not 5*. I wonder whether if he cues 4*, 5* be in order - I believe weak hands can cue seconds - but this is undiscussed. However partner takes flight:

... and I see why. West starts *****K and I take *****A. It would be nice to have an entry to hand, but no. Trumps need 3 rounds, East contributing a spade then a strange *****10. Both follow to *****AQ, and I see that I had another vital card, *****10. Now I am odds-on. Overtake *****J and dummy's spade goes away on *****7. Ruff my spade and advance a low heart, planning to play that *****10. If East has *****J I'm home, also if West has both *****K, *****J, not to mention a too-hasty *****K from East.

West wins \bullet J and returns a spade¹. The ruff and discard is trick 12. It's salutary to reflect that I would have made this contract without \bullet Q.

TIP OF THE MONTH

Here's an auction that is mucked up so frequently that it is definitely worth a Tip.

It is this one:

West	North	East	South
		2 🗸	2NT

And the tip?

After a weak two opening bid by the opponents, 2NT is <u>natural</u>

Seems easy enough, no? But a surprising number of players confuse that 2NT bid with the Unusual 2NT, showing both minors. The UNT only applies after a one-level opening bid, not a two-level bid.

Next time you are dealt

▲ AQx ♥ QJx ♦ KQxx ♣ QJx

you will appreciate that you have a natural notrump bid available after their weak 2 opening. After a one-level opening bid, this hand can bid 1NT, leaving the jump to 2NT available for unusual purposes. Not so, after the two-level opening bid.

And here is a supplementary tip:

After a natural 2NT overcall, play the same methods as after your 2NT opening bid

If partner opens 2NT, then you probably play that 3* is Stayman, or Puppet Stayman, and you might also play transfer responses. If so, then you should do likewise after one of these 2NT overcalls. You do have to adjust the point ranges however, because a 2NT opening bid shows 20-22 HCP, whereas the overcall shows about 16-18 HCP. Playing the same methods after an overcall is known as "system on" and is an excellent mechanism for avoiding disastrous misunderstandings.

Oh, and one more tip, for the more advanced players; feeling generous today.

After a 2NT overcall of a weak two, transfer into the opponent's suit to show a shortage

Suppose you are dealt:

▲ Kxx ♥ x ◆ Axxx ♣ Kxxxx

Partner overcalls their 2♥ opening bid with 2NT. You have enough for game, but are naturally concerned about the heart situation. Bid 3♦, an 'impossible' transfer to hearts. This communicates your concerns. Put this hand together with the one at the top, and you see that you can now reach the superior minor suit game.

Have you ever seen a more stone-cold 3NT than this one? Two spades, one heart, two diamonds and four clubs.

And yet declarer went down on the AJ lead, without doing anything wrong.

What dark magic was at play here?

Declarer won the spade lead and played the ace and king of clubs. East casually followed suit to the second round with the jack! It was a play that couldn't possibly gain or lose in the theoretical sense, but it messed with declarer's head.

South assumed that the clubs were dividing 4-2. So he crossed to the ± 10 , and then attempted to bully his way to dummy in the heart suit. But East didn't allow that, and the winning club withered on the vine.
