

ADELAIDE ADVENTURE

Jamie Thompson shared this wee beauty with me...You hold ▲65 ▼10953 ◆AQ32 ♣1072. It is game all and your right-hand opponent's opening gambit is a 4♠ bid. You pass and 4♠ becomes the final contract and you find yourself on lead. What would you pick? Make your decision before you read on please!

17 out of 19 players apparently picked out the ♥10 as the card to try to beat the contract. 17 out of the 19 declarers made their contract. Jamie was one of two defenders who saw things differently. He reasoned that it was quite unlikely that declarer had opened 4♠ with the ♠K as one of his 13 cards, so Jamie led the ♠A to get a look at dummy. This is the full hand:



Jamie's lead enabled the defence to restrict declarer to 9 tricks. The 19th defender apparently led the \$7 and they restricted declarer to 8 tricks, but I guess that leader couldn't know that dummy didn't have \$AKO...

I don't know if it is a common theme, to lead an Ace against a game bid like that, but this is a great example of thinking on your feet to try to defeat the contract. Nice one Jamie. Page 2 VBA Bulletin June 2019

SECRET SHOPPER REFUTED CLAIRE HUGHES, CANBERRA BRIDGE CLUB

I read Secret Shopper's (SS) article in VBA Bulletin 1905 with some amazement. Had SS attended the same Ballarat Festival of Bridge I had? It certainly didn't appear so as SS was highly inaccurate.

Let's address each of those inaccuracies one by one in order the SS chose.

SS said "The tired, drab buildings row upon row devolved finally into a bowling cum bridge club." Here are two photos of homes in the streets accessing the Ballarat Bridge

Club (BBC): You judge, drab??





SS describes BBC as "The squat building stockaded by cyclone fencing and the odd bush". Yes, the building is typical of bowling clubs of the mid-20th Century, a small



building surrounded by flat, playing areas. BBC recently bought the building and has since set about updating it. Note the growing trees along the fence line and, as one walks

in, the gardens, lovingly tended and environmentally sustainable. The grounds are used by the Ballarat Croquet Club.

Then we come SS's description of the L-shaped Club room with bar along one side of which SS thoughtfully provided a photo. Hmmm, accurate?? No, actually. The room with the bar exists; not L-shaped though and the tables are there for use by the Ballarat Embroiders' Guild several times a week.

Festival dates. SS says Tuesday to Friday. Ah no!! The Festival is held from Wednesday to Saturday though Saturday's Farewell Walk-in Pairs are low-key and great fun. See http://vba.asn.au/congress/ballarat-festival-of-bridge-2/ SS obviously has an inflated sense of their own importance saying "The shock of our entry was noticeable - clearly this event is not expected to attract much outside interest". On the contrary SS, numbers have increased in each of the 4 years it has been held (180, 220, 230 & 240). During various BBC Festivals (I've attended annually for 3 years now), I've met people from Deniliquin, Bendigo, Castlemaine, Mornington the Geelong, Peninsula. Waverley, and Warrnambool not to mention the Canberra contingent (10 this year and similar in previous years). Quizzical looks? Cake "dragged out"?? No, everyone extremely welcoming and happy to be there; that's why Canberra members attend.

Next SS pondered Bendigo's supposed envy of BB**C's** dedicated clubhouse and wondered whether BBC's members "realised how lucky they were". I'm sure BBC members do appreciate their clubhouse. They worked extremely hard to buy it initially and then to pay it off. And that's where their resources have gone over recent years; paying it off. I believe they now own their premises outright.

As to SS's comments about "tired interior", "wilting plants" and "dreary artwork" again a photo speaks louder than words. Isn't, that "dreary artwork" a matter of personal taste? I like the original artwork very much and was tempted to buy some (Age Pension said no). had Additionally, SS thought to ask/communicate they would have been informed of BBC's arrangements repainting and other improvements.

BBC regularly runs Bridge Lessons and there are often new members joining but then SS probably didn't ask about that either.

As to comments on toilets etc, I cannot speak about the male toilets but if they are at the

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standard of the female ones then they are freshly painted, very, very clean and comfortable if period like the building.



I and my friends found the chairs very suitable and comfortable. As any Bridge Club committee member knows finding chairs that suit all players in the current market is very nigh impossible.

Mentioning Ballarat as a Man's Town is disrespectful to all the women who have made, and still make, the town and the BBC what it is. Discussing the age of members shows SS's disconnection with the bridge world in general; we are all aware of our aging population and dearth of young people. Delightful David (BBC) I do apologise I know you are under 60.

I can highly recommend the Ballarat Festival of Bridge as warm, friendly, welcoming of all standards, well run and a very worthwhile addition to any partnership's schedule. See you there next year 25th March 2020.




Solution to Mini #5 (page 3)

This one is a (mini) Grand Coup (don't you just love the name?). You must ruff a winning diamond to make your trumps the same length as East. Play a spade to the ♠Q and ruff the A♠ with your small trump, now a spade to the A♠ and lead a diamond. East is the only opponent left with any trumps and he must ruff with the ♥J or the ♥K, but you will overruff economically and claim the rest. Note that if you do not ruff the A♠ then West will discard a spade and you will be forced to ruff early and will go down.

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
A Cow Flew By DEE HARLEY

Here is a hand I mangled. If you played the Victorian Daytime Swiss Pairs at the VBA you may remember it. I was South



We bid smoothly to 3NT by North, which I corrected to 4♥ by South. West led a small diamond, and I tried to count tricks. Not being able to get to dummy kind of restricts the number of winners to the ones in your own hand. I don't appear to have that many winners.

It is a nice hand though! Maybe I'll count losers instead, 2 Hearts, 2 Clubs and a spade? Two down seems about right. Let's win the A♦ and try and sneak a spade through before they know what's happening. But no! West goes up with the ♠A and plays another diamond. I'm in dummy – I didn't expect that. Now I throw a club, another on the ♠K and a third club on the ♠Q. No ruff. So now the position is:



At this point I have lost one trick, and the lead is in North. I can afford to lose one Heart (not 2) and I will lose a club. This leads very nicely into this month's Suit Combination:

SUIT COMBINATION

You require 5 tricks from this suit You: AKJ976 Dummy: 3

I wish I had known then what I know now! I went one down.





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*** Knave Of Clubs *** Managing Late Entries

In this week's hand, both players stretched slightly to arrive in a slam. North's double of two hearts was, in the modern way, for takeout. When the spade fit came to light, an exchange of cue bids suggested both players felt slam suitable. North was short in hearts and South had the Ace so 24 hcp in the other three suits seemed to suggest that an ace and queen, at most, were missing so North used RKC and bid the slam. West led the king of hearts and South paused to form a plan.

The bidding suggested that West started with the king of clubs to justify overcalling 2♥ vulnerable. As he had only eight top winners, declarer saw that he needed to make four trumps, four diamonds, the two round-suit aces and two heart ruffs in dummy to come to twelve tricks. It is important to have a plan like this even if you cannot yet see the organization of the play. Since the auction suggests the ♣K is offside, a good plan will try to avoid the club finesse since you have a sure diamond loser.

Declarer took the first trick with the ace of

hearts and then ruffed a heart with the two of trumps. After drawing one round of trumps with the AQ, declarer made the key play of leading a low diamond from dummy! East won the trick with eight of diamonds and exited with a club. However, declarer made no mistake and rose with the ace of clubs and ruffing the last heart with the jack of trumps. It was then possible to draw East's remaining trumps and play on diamonds. As the suit was originally 3-2, the ace and king diamonds removed the outstanding diamonds and the two long diamonds were the declarer's eleventh and twelfth tricks. It is important to see that playing the diamond ace and king and then ducking one leaves no diamond entry and a heart return shortens dummy's trump holding so that trumps cannot be drawn before playing the diamonds even if there were a 3-2 trump split.

Solution to Suit Combination (page 5)

AKJ976 (South) opposite 3 (North):

Needing 5 tricks: According to <u>SuitPlay</u> this is a 69% shot by playing small towards the J or small towards the 9 (covering any higher honour of course). Interestingly my Bridge Encyclopedia tells me that finessing the Knave is 2% better than cashing the Ace and King, and that finessing the 9 is 1% better than cashing the Ace and King. (Although the closest combination I found in the encyclopedia was AKJ987 opposite x)
