# MYSTERY WRITER CHEEKY MONKEY



It was an online teams match. You are South and your (International level) opponents are playing a fancy system. Both sides are vulnerable, and you are in 4<sup>th</sup> seat.


Your Hand:

AKQ96 ♥ 6 ♦ KQJ ♣ K953

Bidding (with explanations):



- 1. 4+♥ could be canape 9-14
- 2. 4+ Non-Forcing
- 3. I had options but decided to double
- 4. 4 **V** 5+ •
- 5. Partner is known to have Heart length (including a stopper please partner!)
- 6. My hearts look well-placed, and you play them well.




The lead was ♦7 (3rds & 5ths)

I took East's  $\diamond$  10 with my  $\diamond$  Q then paused to think.

It looked easy - play 2 rounds of spades unblocking the 10 and then finesse the heart. Cash my 8 winners and exit a Diamond.

But what if West didn't have the VK? it would be catastrophic. So, I decided that if he didn't have the Heart King, he may very well think that I have got it and get a bit desperate in the defence.

Or he might clear the diamonds and then when I try heart finesse and it fails, I will be worse off, but what the heck I nonetheless decided to exit with the •K. Sure enough, he decided I had to have •K and went after the club suit. 10 tricks. The full hand:



You might initially have wondered why I gave our mystery writer a nom-de-plume of "cheeky monkey", but when you follow the play, I think you will understand.

You may send in your guess as to the identity of cheeky monkey, but I will not publish the name, although I will report anyone who managed to identify our mystery writer correctly.

The Spring league has come to a close. We have had an interesting time as organisers. Here are the notable points from my position.

- Getting used to setting up matches takes a bit of computer understanding, a bit of practise and a lot of common The captains who have managed to create the matches and run them seamlessly are few and far between! Most players encountered a match where they find themselves playing their team-mates, or waiting for players to arrive, or playing the wrong number of boards. I am delighted to report that every player has been understanding about the situation, and what's more ALL of the matches have managed to reach a conclusion. I can also report that as a whole we are getting better at setting up the matches. Troublesome incidents are occurring less and less as we gain experience.
- The biggest trouble point is the standing instruction about Undo. We have had two appeals concerning the undo feature. I repeat that VBA policy is to allow all undo requests. However, people should only request an undo if they made an accidental bid or play that was not what they intended to do. example, you suddenly remember the system after having made your bid, you should not request an undo. I once had a situation where we had been playing North/South all event but suddenly in the last round we were East/West and I had not noticed. My partner opened 1NT and the next hand passed. I thought that my partner had passed and my RHO had opened 1NT so I passed with my 11 count. Lazy stupidity on my part. I did not request an undo, what do YOU think should have happened?
- The best bit for me has been the number of times I get an email results along these lines: "In an enjoyable and friendly but competitive match Blah beat blah 2 65-58.

I really have had a lot of such emails. And very very few matches are 'troublesome'. Looking through the email results file I have, it appears most of you enjoy the format and the competition and the camaraderie.

So that leads me nicely onto what will we do next? (page 3!)

I'm hoping we get at least as many entries as last year, and that "**Big Dills"** and Plate winners "**International"** will be among the contestants as reigning champions.


Entries for that competition will open after we have finished the Summer league.

It's not often that a weak two bid is passed around to you in 4th seat and you hold a 4 count. Kitty Muntz was playing in an international online match in the ReynoldsTeamMatches.

These events were started by Tom Reynolds when the ACBL cancelled the Columbus NABC. Anyone can enter, but it is intended for experienced players. This month Kitty's team (Kitty Muntz-Leigh Gold Kim Frazer-Jamie Ebery) have won all their matches against foreign teams and are through to the 4th round (the last round before the quarter finals)

Back to the hand....It wasn't any old 4 count:



Lead: ♠K

Kitty "knew' her partner had a penalty pass and after some thought she just bid a quiet 3. She couldn't have been surprised that her partner Leigh Gold bid 3NT. Over this she bid 4. hoping for a pass. Leigh bid 4NT and Kitty now pulled this to 5.

The K was led and Kitty ducked and ruffed and played the ten of clubs. West won the Knave and persisted with a small spade and Kitty ruffed again and played Ace and and another trump. West exited with a Diamond. It looked to Kitty that prospects were dim but undaunted she saw a possibility - if West had 6 spades and three hearts they would be come under pressure. So, she won the Diamond exit ruffed a Diamond and ran her clubs. West was squeezed and eventually had to let go a heart and now Kitty played the hearts from the top. Well done!

Can you see the way for West to beat the contract?

# VIEW FROM THE RESTRICTED ZONE TONY GEORGESON

All our lives have been changed by this pandemic. But we are fortunate that the U3A has been a window into the perspectives of others and helped keep us all calm....even though it is a time of major change.

The pandemic has transformed the world of Bridge and adapting to the changes was necessary to prevent Bridge Deprivation Syndrome developing in those whom I describe, tongue in cheek, as the most 'calm' of all U3A members.... the Bridge enthusiasts.

There is no doubt that the social aspect of meeting friends in pleasant Bridge venues in Bayside was a valued part of our weekly lives. It was possible to play each day of the week and most nights. In addition to the U3A Bridge classes, Bayside is well endowed with well run, affable and pleasant Clubs. Jan and Peter's big Club over many venues in Bayside, Terry and his friends at Beaumaris, George and Boris at spacious premises in Dendy and Jeff at Gardenvale. Plus, Community Centres such as Sandy and Castlefield held Bridge sessions. Of course, the Golf Clubs had regular sessions plus the many convivial private gatherings made Bridge a healthy anchor for the weekly lives of many, many people.

So, it all stopped in March 2020.

Then the transformation took place. Bridge went 'online'. It actually had already been thriving on a website known as Bridge Base Online. But the close-down in March meant that Bridge players took to BBO with increasing enthusiasm.

A rumour was that Bill Gates and Warren Buffett who are Bridge enthusiasts gave support to BBO? If true, the moral support they gave to BBO has been greatly appreciated. Because there was now a serious interpersonal vacuum to be filled for people worldwide and BBO needed more IT resources to handle it. These were acquired quickly, it seems. Suddenly online, new, but different friendships were possible because players were in contact with others from all over the

world, not just bayside and Melbourne. People with differing skills and Bridge experiences. Tournaments were started online and it was remarkable how quickly people accepted that they had to learn how to log on, navigate their way around the pages so they could make bids in the usual manner and then bliss of bliss, play the cards. We learned how to 'chat' also! Their iPads, tablets, laptops, and smart phones became even more beneficial. Then the Bridge Clubs, The Victorian Bridge Association and the Australian Bridge Federation took the initiative to 'Australianise' online Bridge. It has succeeded.

We have to acknowledge though that not all can gain easy access to such online facilities, nor have the desire to substitute the internet for real human contact during this enforced isolation. I was a reluctant newcomer. I had to be dragged to BBO. I already spent so much time in front of my PC that the thought of more internet time did not excite but then I realised something. For me, the alternative was not attractive. No Bridge at all!



#### PLAY PROBLEM #12 - SOLUTION

Last month you had a 4 contract to play.



Lead: ♣8

Contract 4♠

Bidding:

W N E S

- - 1♣ 3♠

**Pass** 

West leads the \$8, East wins the \$Q and cashes the \$A before switching to the •K.

All Pass


Denny got this problem somewhat right, but I'm a bit fussy about using correct technique.

It is entirely correct to duck the ♠K, since East may err and switch to a club. Also, by doing this you rectify the count for any potential squeeze which may emerge. No other continuation can harm your line of play, since you should play to set up the heart suit, retaining an entry to dummy with the ♠4. Most likely East will continue diamonds.

You win with the ◆A and play ▼A and ruff a heart (with a high spade – why not the Ace!), play the ♠Q to the ♠K (check everyone follows - as a 3-0 spade break will likely defeat you) and then ruff a heart with the ♠J and play the ♠8 to dummy's ♠9 and ruff your third heart. By this time, if the hearts were 4-3, then your ▼8 in dummy is now established, you can play the ♠3 to dummy's ♠4 and throw your losing diamond on the ▼8. Glorious.

Here is a routine 4♥ to play. – On ye go!

You: K432 Partner: J765


How would you play this suit to guarantee one trick in the suit regardless of the suit layout.

# \*\*\* KNAVE OF CLUBS \*\*\* A STRONG PASS METHOD

It is difficult to bid really long suits accurately. The methods for bidding 7 card suits are well known but using them with 8 or 9 card suits leaves one a bit anxious about the extra, undisclosed length. When a 10-card suit makes an appearance, it is scary. These are very rare, occurring about once every quarter of a million hands. To get that in context, if you play 25 hands per day, 7 days per week with extra sessions on some weekends, 52 weeks per year and keep this up for 25 years then you will be approaching the quarter of a million hands mark. At a VBA congress event, I picked up my second ever 10 card-suit with the first having been more than 40 years previously while at university. Look at the West hand. You are the dealer, and you feel every emotion from excitement to panic as you try to decide what to open. Most of the field opened 4♥ (or 4♣ Namyats), North doubled and South bid 5. Now the auctions started to deviate.



Most Wests felt they hadn't bid enough with 4♥ and so backed in with 5♥. One pair played it there redoubled making 13 tricks! Others faced an unsound 4♠ overcall and had to pass partner's penalty double to collect 800 or 1100 rather than bidding 5♥. Of those who opened

5♥, some played there and some had to make a decision after North's double and South's 6♣ bid. If they passed, the penalty for 6♣X was a paltry 500.

Are there any other bidding options? There is an exotic option to pass and try to judge what to bid on the next round since we cannot be shut out. I tried that and North opened 1♠. Partner, a well-known operator, made a strong 1NT overcall despite the singleton Q♥! Now 6♥ seems quite attractive although partner's eyes certainly bulged as I pulled the 6H card from the bidding box. North led the AS and followed it with a small one. The ♠K is going to let us avoid the diamond finesse so declarer must take care to not let East ruff it if the spades are 6511 Play small and ruff in hand and then claim 12 tricks after what turned out to be a good auction.

### **Solution to Suit Combination** (page 5)

From this combination you need to guarantee just one trick:

You: K432 Partner: J765

Imagine you played up towards the King and LHO plays low. If you play the King and RHO wins the Ace, it is entirely possible that the Ace was singleton and unless you can endplay LHO, you cannot make a trick in the suit.

Having completed that mind exercise, you realise you must play low from dummy. Now on retaining the lead you again lead low towards the King (Always good practice to lead up to honours!). This time if LHO follows suit with any card except the Ace, you may play the King knowing you cannot fail to make a trick! For if RHO wins with the Ace, the suit must break 3-2 and you can claim a trick in the 4<sup>th</sup> round of the suit. If LHO shows out on the second round you can lead up to the Jack for a trick. If RHO shows out on the second round, your King will already have won a trick.

Playing low from both hands will guarantee one trick in the suit. Any other play has the possibility to make 0 tricks in the suit!
